## Hastings will reduce tax rate in 2014

## City, county among the few to lower rates

Statewide, there are 40 cities operating with budgets greater than \$10 million. Only four of them are reducing their property tax levies next year, and of those four, Hastings leads the way in paring down the budget. Hastings is expected to approve a levy for 2014 that is 2.5 percent lower than this year's levy.

"This is probably the first budget in five or six years where it's easy to have a smile on my face in talking about (where we're headed) in 2014," said Danna Elling Schultz, chair of the council's finance committee.

Hastings' budget process began in April and will be finalized Dec. 16. The long process, plus a number of staffing changes, gave the city an opportunity to ask some new questions, said City Administrator Melanie Mesko Lee.

Then in July, the finance committee of the city council (which includes Schultz, Tony Nelson and Tony Alongi) gave staff a firm goal. They wanted next year's tax rate to go back to what it was in 2012, which was 66.25 percent. The 2013 tax levy rate is 68.402 percent.

In September, the city set the preliminary tax levy amount at \$11,610,920. That amount, which is about \$370,000 less than the 2013 levy, was based off the finance committee's directive to lower the tax rate. As the process continued, staff recalculated the tax rate based on the preliminary total levy amount and found that next year's tax rate comes in below target, at 65.855 percent.

Two actions at the state level helped the city pull together a smaller tax levy. One was the return of local government aid (LGA). Hastings has not received any LGA funding from the state in several years, but will get \$510,000 in 2014.

LGA funds are being used next year for one-time capital investments – big-ticket items that don't need to be purchased every year.

Personnel costs account for 38 percent of the total 2014 budget. Some of the changes being proposed are an overall compensation adjustment for all regular, full and part-time staff; some additional hours; additional seasonal staff; and a consultant to help the city work smarter and bring more value for the dollars it receives.

## Hastings native to compete in National Finals Rodeo

Tyler Corrington of Hastings is ranked fourth in the world standings going into the National Finals Rodeo (NFR) with just over \$97,000 earned in sadale bronc riding this year.

This Saturday, Dec. 7, Corrington fans are invited to Dan's Bar in New Trier for a viewing party at 7 p.m. The world standings race will be determined the following Saturday after contestants compete in 10 straight days at the Super Bowl of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association.

According to Scott Werner, several of Tyler's friends and his mother Stacey came up with the idea to have a fan party at Dan's bar.

"When Tyler is home he hangs out there and has a few beers," Werner said. "The first time he was home after the 2011 NFR he stopped over." Corrington's signature is on

a Texas Ranger cap in the bar. "Danette (Welch, who owns the bar) asked for his autograph and he took off his hat

and signed it," Werner said.

The National Finals Rodeo runs Dec. 5-14 in Las Vegas. Great American Country is televising the finals. More than \$6 million will be awarded in prize money. Corrington will
